How to get around

To get around in Munich, there are lots of tickets (valid for U-Bahn, S-Bahn, tram and bus), e.g.

Single-Tageskarte Innenraum	€ 4,50
Single Tageskarte Gesamtnetz	€ 9,00

(i.e. a day-ticket for a single person)

Partner-Tageskarte Innenraum	€ 8,00
Partner-Tageskarte Gesamtnetz	€ 16,00

(i.e. a day-ticket for up to five persons)

How to get from Munich airport to the city and back

1. A taxi from/to the airport costs ca. € 50,-
2. You can take the train called S-Bahn. There are two lines, but both go to the Hauptbahnhof (Central Station) and to Marienplatz. You can get off at Hauptbahnhof and take a taxi to your hotel. This should be less expensive. For the S-Bahn you can take a "Single-Tageskarte Gesamtnetz" if you are on your own (€ 9,-) or a "Partner-Tageskarte Gesamtnetz" (€ 16,-) for up to 5 people; the taxi then should not be more than ca. € 10,-.
3. The hotel Maritim is next to the Central Station, so those staying there can walk there from the station. To the other hotels, it is a ca. 10 - 15 minute walk (or a short taxi ride).
4. For the hotel Marienbad you can leave the S-Bahn at Karlsplatz (between Hauptbahnhof and Marienplatz) and then take the tram 27 and get off at Karolinenplatz.

5. For the Pension am Kaiserplatz, take the S-Bahn to Marienplatz and then take the U-Bahn (northbound – either U3 direction Olympiazentrum or U6 direction Garching Hochbrück) to Münchener Freiheit. From there you can walk (ca. 10 minutes) or take a taxi.
